¹ The Scout Association and Mid Sussex District are charities. Small Groups like ours with incomes below £100,00 and no hut ownership are exempt from separate registration with the Charity Commission as part of a special arrangement which reduces our admin. However, as a federated Scout Group charity we still comply with charity rules. Note that Mid Sussex District is the official owner of The Barn.

SECTION B STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Group's governing documents are those of the The Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the Association and The Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association. Our Constitution is found in Section 5.c.1 of POR

The Group is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Scouts.

The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

The Group is managed by the Group Trustee Board, the members of which are the 'Charity Trustees' of the Scout Group which is an educational charity. As charity trustees they are responsible for complying with legislation applicable to charities. This includes the registration, keeping proper accounts and making returns to the Charity Commission as appropriate. The Group is exempt from separate registration with the Charity Commission; we come under the wider Scout umbrella registration.

The Board meets every 2 months. Members of the Trustee Board undertake mandatory training² provided by the Scout Association and role-specific training as required.

² Mandatory training for Trustees consists of a trusteeship module, GDPR and inclusion. All trustees also, along with all adults in the movement, must undertake regular Safety and Safeguarding training and be familiar with the Yellow Card and Purple Card.

SCOUTS

Report: Louise Downey (Team Leader)

The troop currently has 30 scouts and 4 leaders, plus two new leaders who have joined the troop this term to prepare for the second troop launching in September 2026.

Over the year 1 scout earned their Adventure Challenge Award, 2 earned their Outdoors Challenge Award, 1 earned their Team Leader Challenge Award, and 1 earned their Creative Challenge Award, 1 earned their Skills Challenge Award, and 2 earned their World Challenge Award. A wide range of activity badges were awarded including Chef, Entertainer, Librarian, Sports Enthusiast, Hikes, Time on the Water and Nights Away.

Last summer the troop had a fantastic week-long camp at Ardingly, joining hundreds of other scouts and guides from across the county, and the world, at the West Sussex Scout Jamboree. Scouts camped as part of the Mid Sussex District contingent. A huge range of activities were available including climbing, high ropes, water sports, inflatables, zorbing, archery and rifle shooting, scouting skills sessions and team challenges.

Autumn term began with a welcome back and games session, followed by a troop forum and patrols creating and voting to run their own troop night activities: Hawk patrol's idea for a "Tech Deck" takeover was selected first, and Eagle patrol's murder mystery escape room was selected second. Both patrols did a great job planning and running their sessions during the term. In early September the raft race tested the scouts' teamwork and raft building skills. Scouts helped the group raise funds by taking part in the Group Sponsored Walk on the South Downs in October and the Orchards bucket collection in November. Also in November, Scouts joined the other sections at the Remembrance Day commemoration in Haywards Heath.

The troop tried international cookery, completed a scavenger hunt, splashed about and whizzed down the slides at the Triangle, and learned lots of fitness moves. A night hike near Wivelsfield gave scouts some good practice of nighttime navigation before Escape and Evasion in late November. And UK Parliament Week helped them learn about our democratic processes, including running their own debates.

In January, our scout team did brilliantly to come third in the District Scouts Quiz despite being a team of two! Despite very muddy conditions, Scouts had great winter camp at Parkwood later in January. Spring term troop meetings began with leaping and bounding around Crawley Parkour, followed by some sessions on emergency aid and water safety, the latter supported by a visitor from the RNLI. Scouts tested their rhythm and fitness with some 'Swoove', and we headed out for night hikes near Cuckfield and Scaynes Hill. At the opening ceremony for The Barn, Henry wrote and delivered a fantastic speech, and Ellie, Patrick and Oliver were interviewed for the TV news. Further to the amazing opportunity of meeting Tim Peake that day, subsequent troop meetings gave Scouts the chance to learn

more about being an astronaut, along with spotting the International Space Station as it travelled over The Barn, and spotting constellations in some amazingly clear night skies.

From January to March, scouts participated in several Overland Hike training hikes, the Checkpoint Challenge and a full Overland weekend practice. Patrick and Ellie formed a joint Overland Hike team with two scouts from 5th Burgess Hill Scout Group. The team worked really well together, successfully completing the competition, hiking approx. 20 miles carrying all their equipment for the weekend, camping overnight, and undertaking a wide range of challenges. Their dedication, teamwork and speed were rewarded with a fantastic second place.

The annual Monopoly Run in early March was a great fun day out, with two teams dashing around, exploring the sights and sounds of London on foot, bus, tube and train. Then at the District Scouts Cooking Competition in April, our team cooked up an oriental feast and achieved second place, with just a few points in it.

The summer term's troop meetings continued the space theme, with Leo Bilton teaching scouts all about black holes, alongside a 'space show-and-tell'. We enjoyed visiting the Scrase Valley Community Orchard for a tour, sowing seeds, making worm bombs and bat-detecting. Scouts completed a circular hike near Wivelsfield, where they made friends with some inquisitive cows. The visit from a local arachnid expert gave scouts the chance to learn about and touch some very large, hairy spiders. Thanks to the Cub leaders for supporting an evening of archery, bottle rockets and games at Broadstone Warren. And double thanks to Chris, who then taught scouts essential bike maintenance skills the following week. Scouts were invited to participate in a special 'Bioblitz' at Wakehurst Place in May, learning about pollinators and scientific monitoring methods before completing their own flower insect timed counts (FIT Counts).

Scouts tidied, weeded and planted out vegetable plants they'd grown at the Community Garden by The Orchards in Haywards Heath, hiked from Ardingly to Lindfield, then tried out footgolf before finishing the term playing wide games with 10th Haywards Heath Scouts. A team will be competing in the Hardy Cup at the end of June.

We're looking forward to summer camp in July at Phasels Wood campsite in Hertfordshire in July, with lots of amazing activities including climbing, zorbing, tunnelling, dragon boating, and kayaking. We'll also have some days out including a canal boat ride and a visit to Bletchley Park, the home of WW2 code breaking.



TRUSTEE BOARD and behind-the-scenes

Our role is to set strategic goals, ensure that the Group has the resources to continue running - including enough money, equipment, premises, insurance and leaders - and that regulatory requirements are complied with. Safety is our number one focus and we have spent time this year making sure that Scouting with the 5th is as safe as possible whilst not diluting the adventure and challenge.

Our biggest job this year has been getting The Barn open and our Sections moved in (see page 15-16 for more on The Barn). Trustees were instrumental in ensuring all legalities were covered in terms of licences, agreements and insurance, as well as pitching in to lend a hand with the practicalities of moving in and the opening ceremony.

We are pleased to have kept capitation to the same as 24-25 at £15.50 a month. Also, as part of our drive to keep Scouting affordable we have also this year got our second-hand uniform/kit store off the ground which is good for both the environment and family budgets. Huge thanks to Helen Willshire for all her work on this.

Fundraising efforts this year were mainly focused on raising money to build The Barn, including a Sponsored Walk at which our young people raised over £800. However, we have also raised money from a bucket collection in town, from grants, from the Tesco token collections, Easy Fundraising and claiming back Gift Aid. A particular focus for us has been on local visibility and raising the profile of Scouting in the area – we have had presence at Town Day, at church, the Town Museum, Remembrance Day, articles in the local press and you can read about some of our sections' collaborations with other local groups such as the Horticultural Society, Wakehurst Place and Lindfield Village clean.

Trustees also organised a thank you Christmas meal for our leaders whereby we cooked and they came and enjoyed a go at air rifles and a sausage casserole.



We are very grateful to all our Trustees and other adults for their hard work during the year. We have vacancies on the Trustee Board so please speak to the Chair if you know anyone who may be interested.

SECTION D ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

All sections are full, with extensive waiting lists especially for Squirrels. In total the group consists of 22 adults, 3 Young Leaders and 83 young people. Our finances are stable. 2026-27 will see us embark on our expansion plans now that we are settled into the new building, starting with a new Squirrel Drey and a second Scout Troop in September.

We have recruited 6 new leaders this year, but there is always room for more. Behind the scenes we have a quartermaster, Liam, but there are many other behind-the-scenes jobs that can be done.

We are an outward-looking group and participate in many District and County events and competitions. Last summer our Scouts thoroughly enjoyed a week at West Sussex International Jamboree, a huge camp at Ardingly Showground. Our younger sections went along for 'All Sections Day' too on the middle Wednesday. Lots of our adults (leaders and trustees) often help to run local Scouting events. As mentioned in the 'Trustee' section we try to be present at as many town occasions as possible such as Town Day, Remembrance Day, the Town Museum and we have an annual bucket collection in the Orchards at Christmas. As well as our partnership with the Bentswood Hub in The Barn we also work with the Haywards Heath Horticultural Society, the local police and fire brigade and are especially grateful to local school, St Joseph's, who allow us to use their woods for fire/den-building.

Overland success

We are immensely proud of two of our Scouts who, as part of a joint team, came an incredible Second Place in the Overland Hike competition. This is one of Scouting's toughest competitions consisting of a 15 mile Saturday challenge/incident hike and competitive camping overnight followed by another 10 mile hike the following day. All in unpredictable and often chilly March weather and there are always big hills. In the Explorer competition our three Young Leaders were part of a team that also came second. Well done all of you!

Helen has two home-grown leaders and one young-leader in her team, a testament to her outstanding leadership. And the greatest testament is the hundreds of ex-Beavers who have such happy memories of their time in Helen's colony. The 5th Haywards Heath is incredibly grateful for the amount of time, dedication and skill that Helen devotes to Beavers and recognise that 23 years of doing it [now 24] is a magnificent achievement which deserves recognition

Special report on The Barn

"This new scout hut is where our friendships will grow, where confidence builds, and where challenges are faced head on. It's where we'll make memories that last a lifetime. So today we're not just opening a building, we're opening new adventures, new opportunities, and a very exciting future for 5th Haywards Heath Scouts."

The Barn, our brand new purpose-built Scout Centre and Community Hub opened formally on 6th March 2026. It represents the culmination of an enormous amount of hard work by lots of people. The project was managed by a committee consisting of 6 Scouters from District and 5th who met weekly for 18 months. The building is owned by Mid Sussex District (and we owe massive thanks to Mark Scholfield and Alan Dyke for the enormous amounts of work they put in to the project) and licensed to 5th as tenants. The day-to-day management is undertaken by our community partners the Bentswood Hub who use it for all kinds of community services including a very popular youth club on Fridays. The 5th now have four nights at their disposal for Scouting and will be opening new Sections, starting in September. The build, coming in at over £900,000, was funded with money from District (sale of a previous group's hut), Mid Sussex District Council, including Section 106 and £140,000 of grant fundraising. The 5th contributed £8,000 from our own funds plus undertook fundraising such as our Sponsored Walk in October which raised over £800. We have also been successful in raising £60,000 from the National Lottery to kit out the building, this work is ongoing. We held a competition to design a new badge to go on the back of our neckers to commemorate the opening of our first home-of-our-own.

Suddenly, after months of delay, the council finally signed the land lease and it was all-systems-go for the 5th to move their gear from their old stores at Franklands Village to the new stores upstairs at The Barn. Fred put out a call on the Group WhatsApp. At just one day's notice no fewer than 14 people rocked up to help, with willing hands, trailers, vans and tools to dismantle and rebuild some of the gear. In one night most of the gear was shifted across and we could start Scouting after half term. What a team! WHAT a team and such an incredible display of Scouting values. Thank you all

And ...this amazing feat was repeated again 2 weeks later when we had loads of people, leaders and parents alike as well as people from District and other Groups, turn up to help us prepare for, run and clear up after the Opening Ceremony. In torrential rain. Again, you are wonderful human beings and we are so grateful and so fortunate to have the network we do.



Opening Ceremony

We could not talk about The Barn without talking about the magnificent opening ceremony. This was held on 6th March, exactly 1 year after the groundbreaking ceremony. We had lots of special guests including most of our young people, their parents and leaders, plus representatives from other Scout Groups and District. Our new County Lead Volunteer Joe Rogerson attended along with his deputy Julia Kielstra as well as National Scout Chaplain Fr Jonathan How. The local MP Alison Bennett was there, and Duncan Pascoe the Town Mayor along with a number of other local dignitaries and councillors.

And, of course, Major Tim Peake, astronaut and Scout ambassador came along to 'launch' the centre for us and was extremely gracious and generous with his time. He gave our younger sections their space badges and donated to the group a space patch which has actually been into space. The event attracted a lot of attention locally and three of our

young people were on the BBC news as well as our Chair talking on local radio. Despite the rain it was a thoroughly joyful event and a fitting tribute to the hard work of all the people who made it happen after so many years.



SECTION E FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment Policy

The Group does not have sufficient funds or an associated policy that allows it to make longer term investments. The Group has therefore adopted a risk averse strategy to the investment of its funds.

All its money is held in cash using a separate account within our mainstream bank. While this is not a high yield return, we are able to earn a modest amount of interest, although interest rates have started to fall this year. The Group Treasurer regularly monitors bank balances to ensure the Group obtains value and income from its banking arrangements. Currently, as Bank of England interest rates have fallen, there is a lower return, reflected in the interest that we have earned on our account, which was higher earlier in the year. We expect the bank to either change its business approach to paying higher interest rates or Bank of England interest rates to continue to fall in the future, either or both will reduce future credit interest on the account.

We maintain a working balance in a non-interest paying current account while we should look to maintain the bulk of funds are held in an interest paying deposit account. Cash flow would be managed carefully with (almost) instant electronic transfers between the accounts as necessary for large payments or subsidies.

Reserves Policy

The Group maintains sufficient reserves to provide for the ongoing operation of its activities

Risk and Internal Control

The Trustee Board has identified the major risks and areas to which the enlarged 5th Haywards Heath Scout Group may be exposed and records them in our Risk Register. These will be monitored and mitigated when necessary and as they arise. The main areas identified are:

- **Annual Contents Insurance:** Our contents are covered whilst in use anywhere in the UK and the All Risks cover is for contents / equipment used by Scouts and loaned or hired to non-Scout groups.
- **Injury to leaders, helpers, supporters and members:** The Group, through the membership fees contributes to the Scout Association's standard insurance policy. In consultation with the Trustee Board we have taken out an extra insurance policy. The extra insurance is for personal accident cover for occasional helpers (DBS-checked) and non-members with our same insurance provider, Unity.

- **Reduction or loss of Leaders:** The Group is totally reliant on volunteers. If there were a reduction in the number of leaders to an unacceptable level in a particular section or in the Group as a whole then there would have to be a contraction, consolidation or closure of a section. In the worst case scenario, the complete closure of the Group. We continue to encourage parent involvement in order to provide support and keep parents involved and will make appropriate announcements in the Church and its newsletter.
- **Reduction or loss of members:** The Group provides activities for young people as Squirrels, Beavers, Cubs and Scouts aged 4 to 14.5 years. If there were a reduction in membership in a particular section or the Group as whole then there would have to be a contraction, consolidation or closure of a section. In the worst case scenario, the complete closure of the Group.
- **The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR):** The Trustee Board has absorbed the implications of the legislation and the Group has adopted guidelines and produced a final policy which reflects the legislation with respect to Scouting.

Don't forget to check out our secondhand store (see website) for uniform and kit at £1 an item.

We are still looking at ways to fund the purchase of a minibus as we have the administrative capacity to run one and hire it out to other groups in the District. There are many, many occasions where a minibus would be useful, not just camps.
